Birth Control

What is it?

- Birth Control- to prevent unplanned pregnancies
 - Intrauterine Device (IUD)- plastic or metal device inserted into the uterus by a Physician; copper kills sperm and no protection against STD's, some IUD's release a hormone to prevent conception
- Barrier Method- keep sperm from entering the uterus
 - o **Example** male condoms used with spermicidal foam

Permanent Surgical Methods:

- <u>Vasectomy</u>- for the male; the tubes (vas deferens) that carry the man's sperm cells are cut off, clamped off or burned
- <u>Tubal Ligation</u>- for the female; cut or close off the tubes (fallopian tubes) that carry a woman's eggs from the ovaries to the uterus

Facts:

- <u>Male Condom</u>- flexible tube of latex rubber placed on an erect penis before sexual intercourse to trap ejaculated sperm; condoms can be used with other birth control methods
- Most Reliable Condoms

 latex, polyurethane; not total protection against

 STD's/HIV
- Spermicides jellies, foams, suppositories that usually contain nonoxynol-9
 - Allergic to Nonoxynol-9- may develop sores in the vagina or on the penis
- <u>Cervical Cap/Diaphragm</u>- small rubber caps that are filled with spermicide; inserted into the vagina before sexual intercourse to cover the opening of the uterus (cervix); left in place for > 6 hours after intercourse

What can I do?
