Prescription Refill (misc)

What is it?

- <u>Prescription Refill</u>— Pharmacist may not refill a prescription unless the
 health care provider has authorized, the health care provider may authorize
 no refills, one refill, or several refills on the original prescription; after all of
 the refills have been made from the original prescription a pharmacist must
 obtain authorization from the health care provider before the prescription
 can be refilled
 - Pharmacist- may ask your sex or gender, date of birth or age, chronic conditions, allergies, drug reactions, other medications that you routinely take including over-the-counter medications
- <u>Refills-</u> health care providers may not authorize a prescription to be refilled indefinitely or give an open prescription; also all the refills can not be given at one time; may be transferred from one pharmacy to another
 - Prescriptions Returns- cannot be returned once it has left pharmacy, cannot be reused to fill another prescription
 - Copy of Prescription- yes the pharmacist may give you a copy of your prescription but may not dispense a medication from a copy of a prescription



- <u>Internet Refills</u>- many places may order any time of the day or night using your credit card number just with your prescription number
- Ways to Refill- in person, by phone, online, or by mail
- Noticing a Medication is Not Working
 - teens sometime need to change the
 dose of a medication during puberty or after a growth spurt; see your
 health care provider if your medication isn't working as well as it use to
